

URGENT ACTIONS FOR THE RECOVERY OF EUROPEAN BISON POPULATIONS IN ROMANIA

AN ICONIC SPECIES

Nearly gone extinct in the last century, the **European bison** was rescued from among the last animals living in captivity. The species is still considered vulnerable, with **less than 2.000 free individuals in Europe**, in 14 isolated populations. Of these, only 5 (located in Poland) are demographically viable.

The bison is a charismatic species with an important ecological role: it helps maintain a mosaic of forested areas and grasslands, a landscape which is highly valuable for its biological diversity and role in mitigating climate challenges. Moreover, the bison is an "umbrella-species" that helps maintain ecological corridors on a large scale, allowing for migration of other wildlife species such as the brown bear, the wolf or the lynx.



OUR VISION

Romania was part of the bison's native range and the species used to roam freely in the Southern Carpathians until 200 years ago.

Rewilding Europe and WWF-Romania are aiming to create a free bison population by reintroducing at least 100 individuals in the Southern Carpathians by 2020.

We strive to keep the local community actively involved in the preservation of their natural heritage and to foster their pride in supporting the bison comeback.

We want to see the area **turning into a dynamic showcase** for the conservation of rare species, where ecology, sustainable development and nature conservation become subjects of interest for the youth.



MAIN PROJECT ACTIVITIES

Nature conservation: Two stable and interconnected bison sub-populations are established in the Țarcu and Poiana Ruscă Mountains (Romania), by rewilding individuals from European nature reserves and breeding centres.

Education: A multi-disciplinary research programme is developed with (inter)national universities, think-tanks and other projects. A youth bison education programme is rolled out locally to build knowledge and engagement in bison conservation and to create opportunities for further professional development.

Nature-based tourism: Innovative services and products are developed for tourists worldwide, based on the bison and other wildlife watching.

Communications: Creating awareness about the rewilding of bison and its benefits to both nature and communities, and bringing people closer to nature, in the Southern Carpathians.
